URI Goes Paperless...

New Project Tracking is Unveiled

URI has just introduced a new labor and equipment tracking system that is going to make project cost tracking simpler and more accurate than anything offered in the industry today. Ongoing project cost reports can be retrieved from URI's shared website instantaneously, and will be made available to facility/property managers, as well as insurance companies. The system will be employed on most all emergency service projects.

How It Works

Project employees are assigned ID cards with bar codes. All equipment used on the project is also bar-coded. Each day, project employees are scanned in and out of the project site, and operating equipment is scanned by the project supervisor. This information is then translated into descriptions and rates and is placed on the shared website, which is made available to the customer and insurance personnel by assigning user names and passwords.

The system has been employed on three larger restoration projects to-date, and trouble-shooting has been minimal, according to Jim Baliya, URI's technical guru. "We've received great feedback from insurance company consultants and accountants," says Mr. Baliya. "They seem to feel comfortable and confident of the system. Everyone has been more receptive to the change than I expected. The nice thing is, everyone is starting to realize that you don't need a truckload of paperwork to document a project."

Reducing Business Interruption... Free Disaster-Ready Training!

URI is currently offering free seminars to facility janitorial and maintenance personnel. The training covers what facilities should do in the first 30 minutes following a disaster, such as a fire, flood, or a water pipe break. The seminar will cover containment procedures after an incident, prevention of secondary damages, information gathering, and the identification of potentially dangerous conditions following an event.

Seminars will be approximately 90 minutes long, and can be scheduled by calling Glenn Davis at 1.888.327.9664. We would ask that classes be planned on a regional basis with 10 to 30 students. All attendees will receive a moisture meter, enabling them to check building materials for moisture content after an occurrence.
